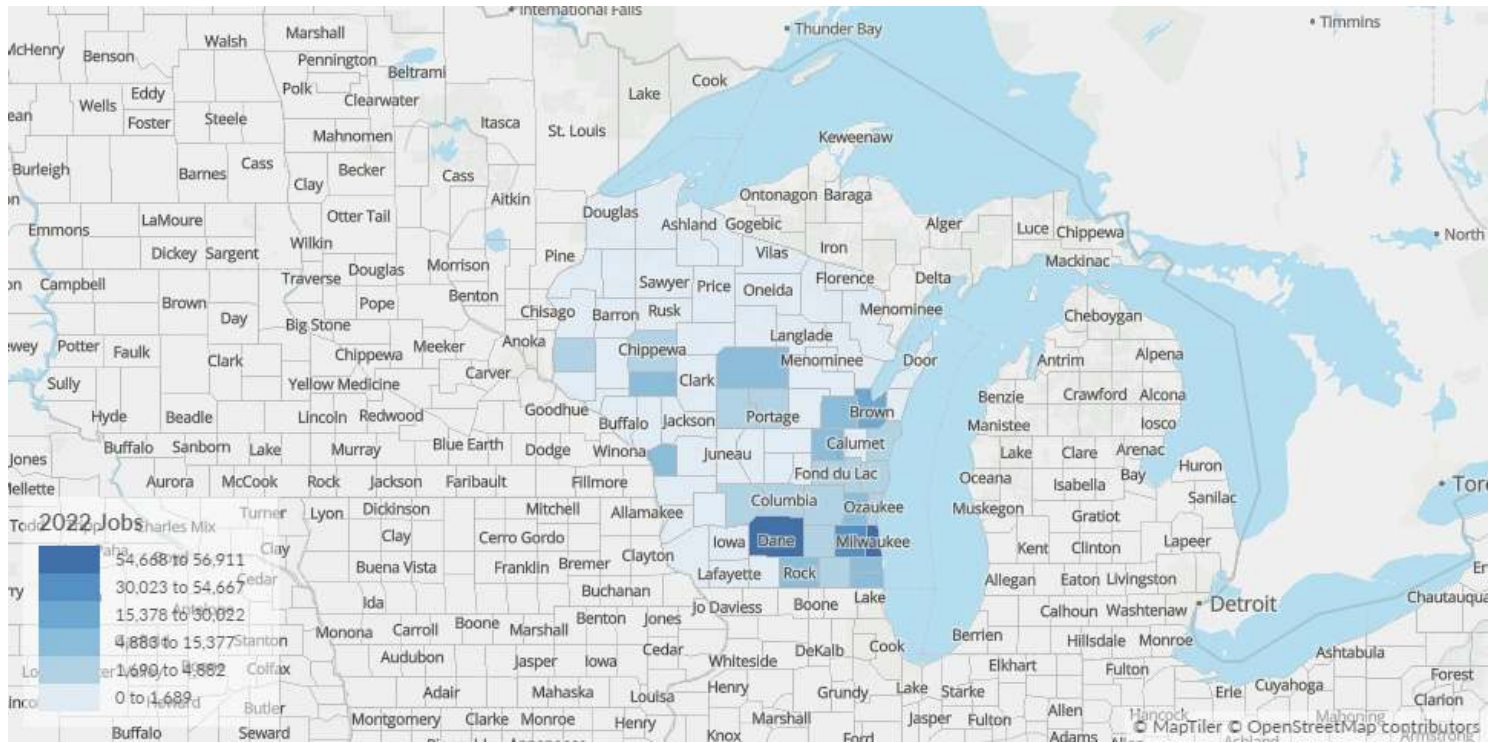

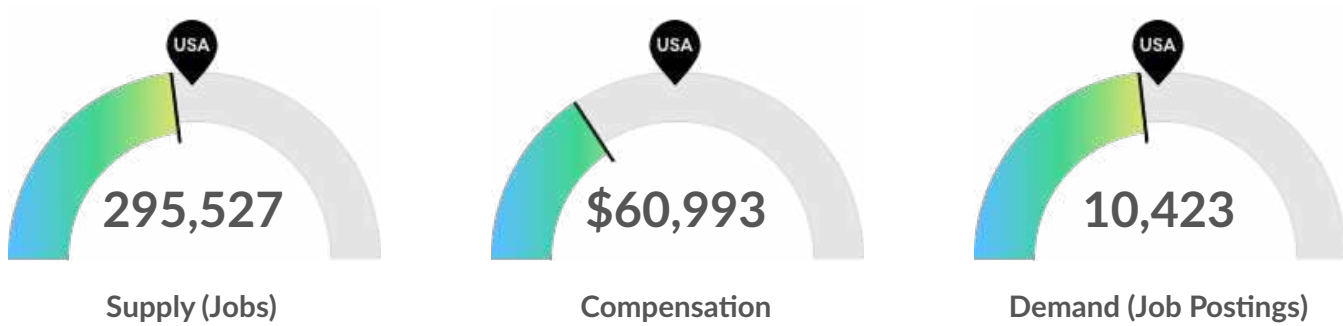

Light Hiring Competition Over a Thin Supply of Regional Talent



Wisconsin is not a hotspot for this kind of talent. The national average for an area this size is 331,913* employees, while there are 295,527 here.

The cost for talent is low in Wisconsin. The national median salary for your occupations is \$68,599, while you'll pay \$60,993 here.

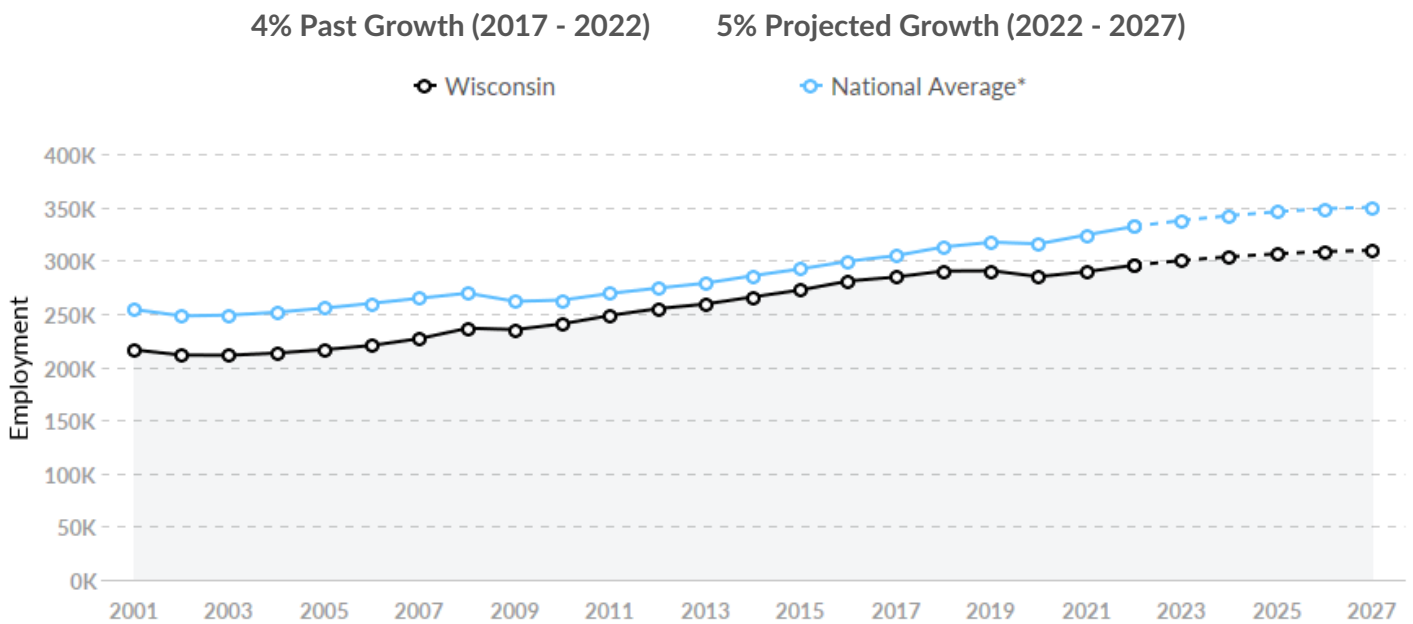
Competition from online job postings is low in Wisconsin. The national average for an area this size is 11,598* job postings/mo, while there are 10,423 here.

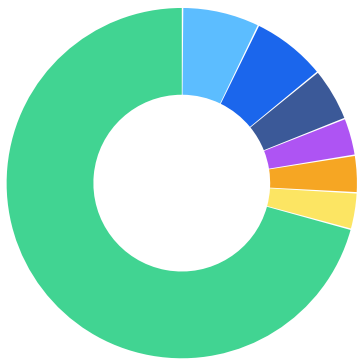
Supply Is Lower Than the National Average

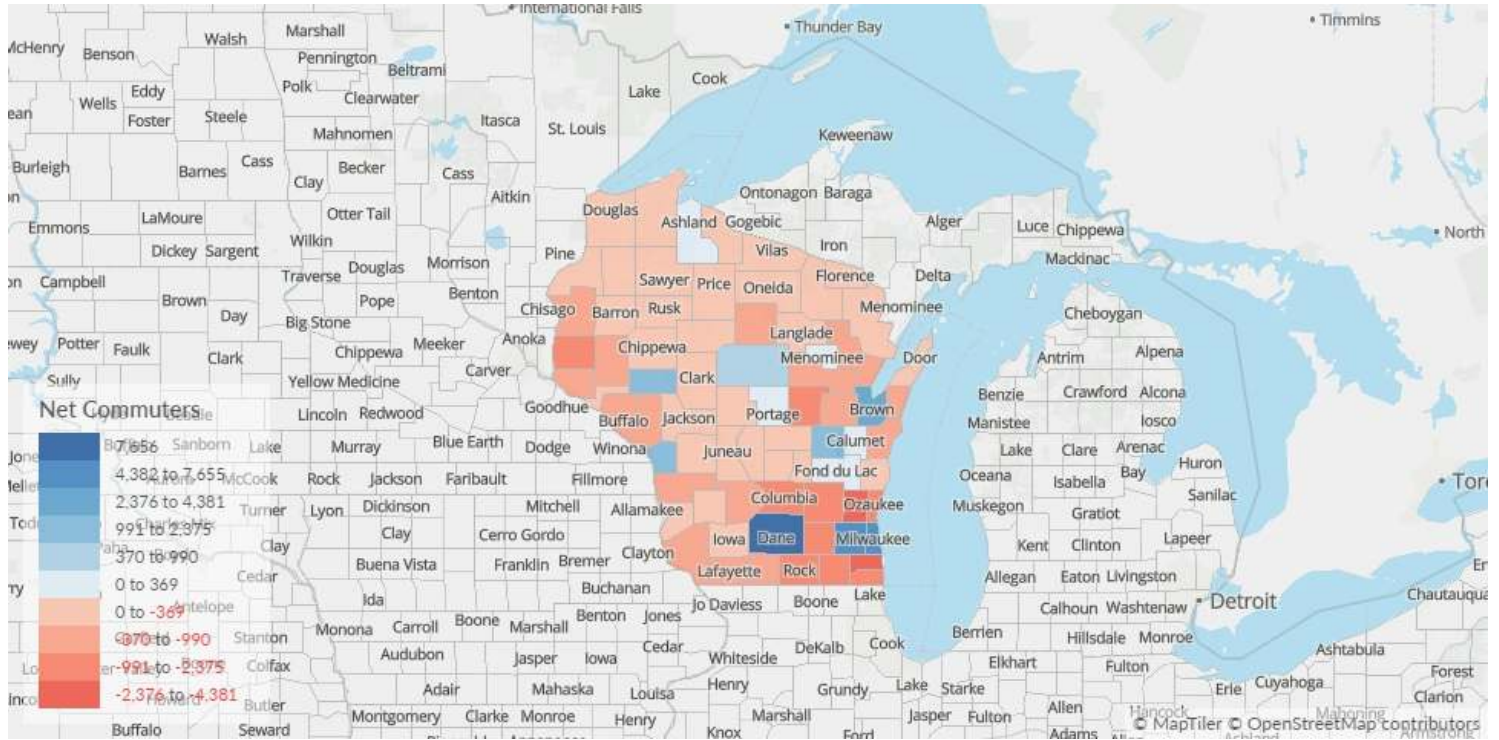

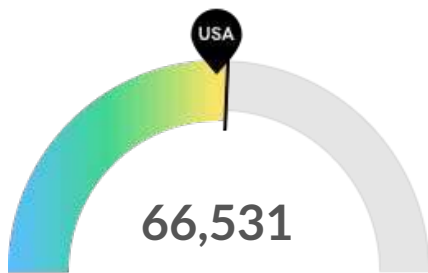

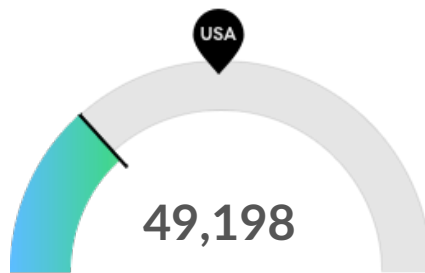

Retirement Risk Is About Average, While Overall Diversity Is Low



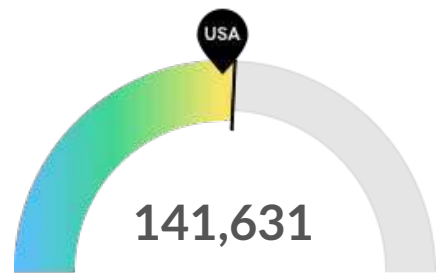
Retiring Soon

Racial diversity is low in Wisconsin. The national average for an area this size is 110,153* racially diverse employees, while there are 49,198 here.



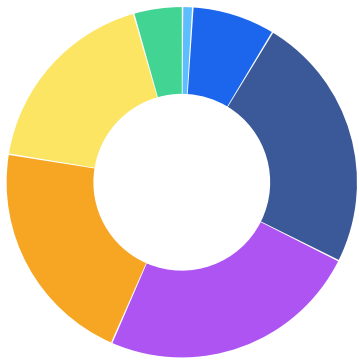
Gender Diversity

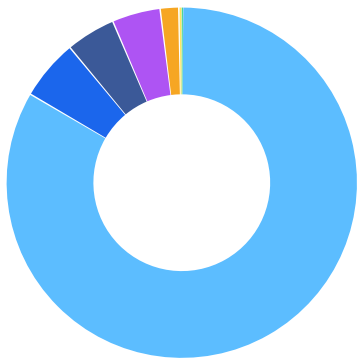

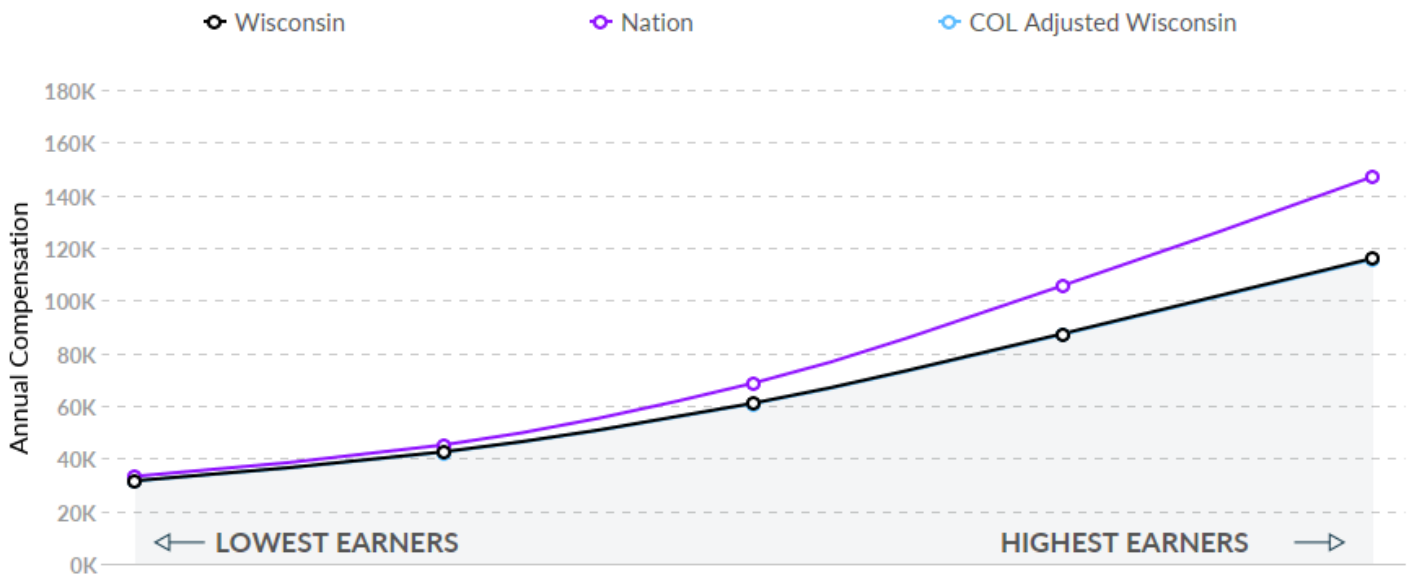

Compensation

Talent Is 11% Cheaper, While the Cost of Living May Make Attraction Difficult

In 2021, the median compensation for your occupations in Wisconsin is \$60,993. Based on the national median wage of \$68,599 for this position, this means you will spend about 11% less to employ your occupations here. However, their actual purchasing power will be 11% less than the national median when we adjust for regional cost of living (which is 0% higher than average). This may make it harder to attract talent to the region at this price.

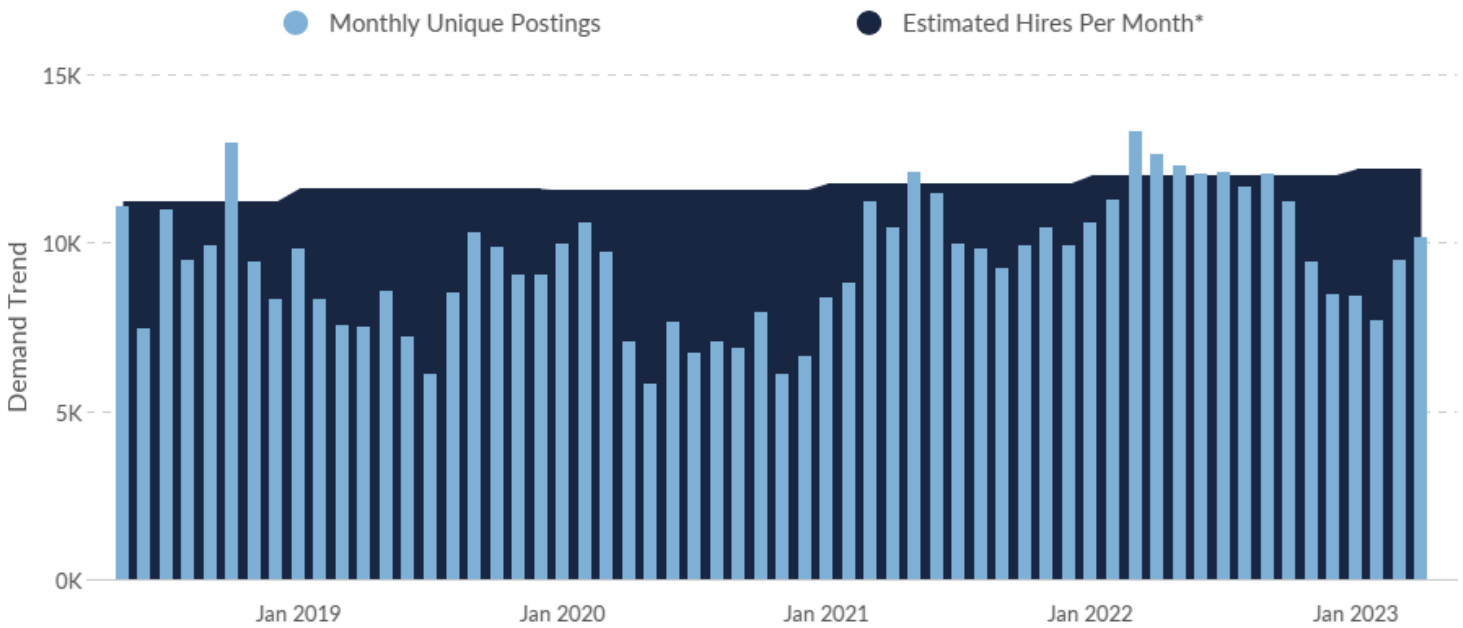

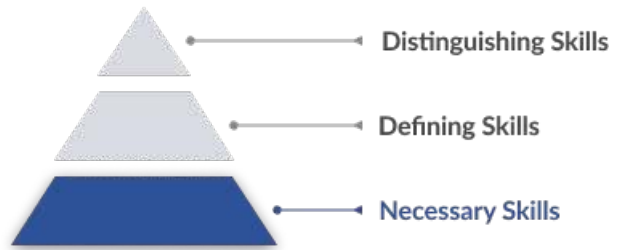

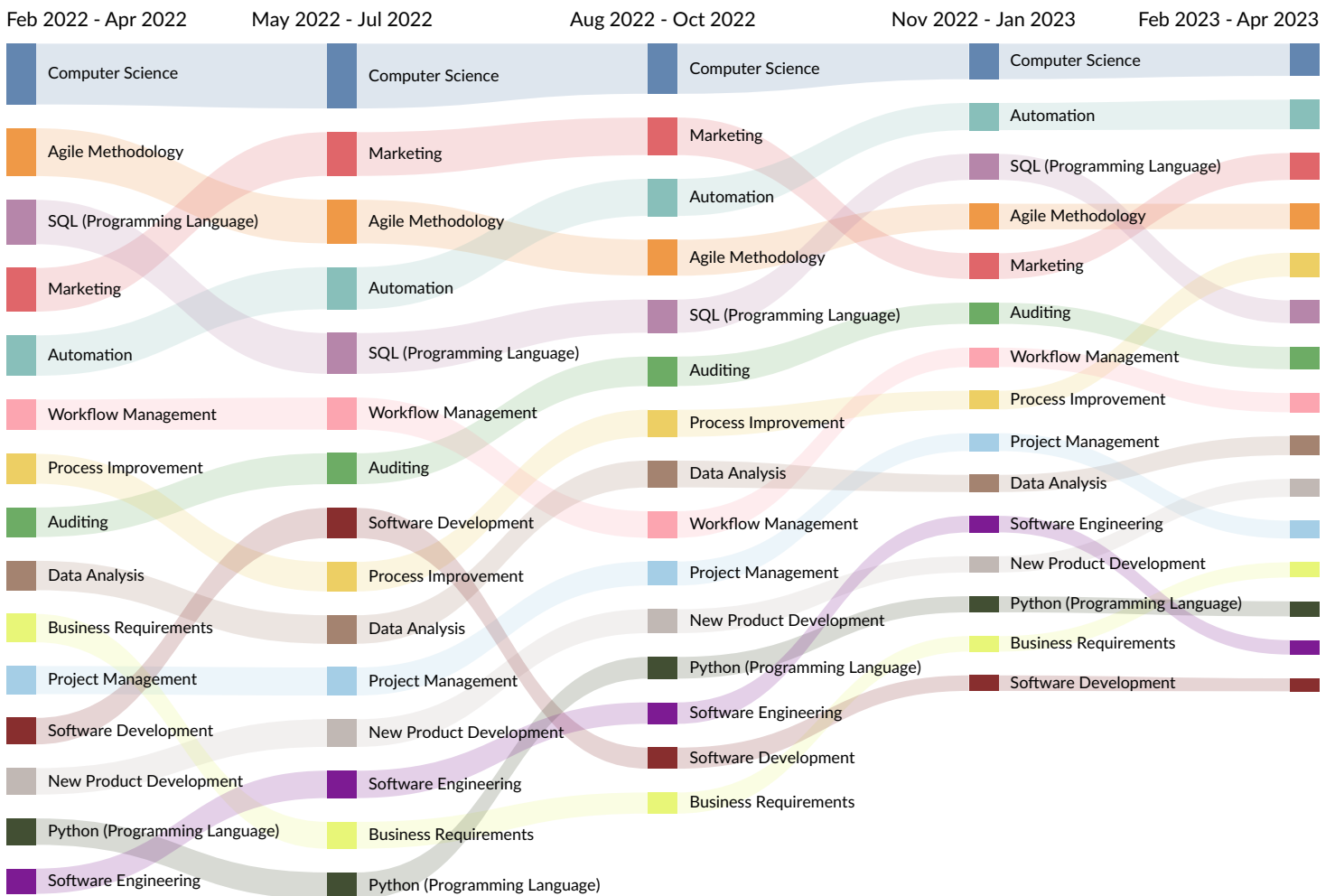

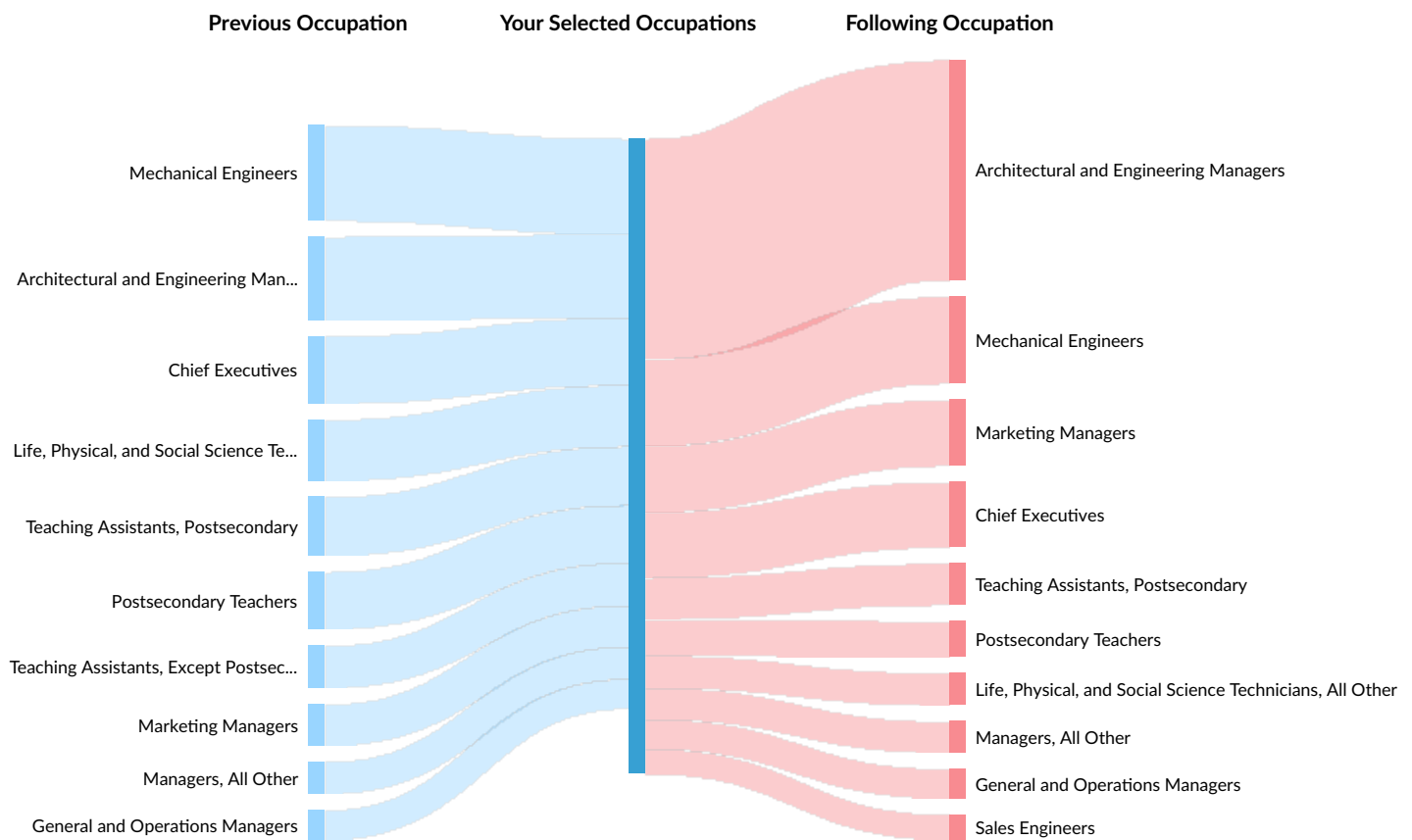
